## Fox the Tiger By Corey R. Tabor

Before Reading: Examine the cover and ask your student to make predictions about the story. Have your student practice reading and sounding out key words found in the story:

During Reading: As you read with your student, continue to focus on sounding out the key words.

Model reading the dialogue between the characters with voices and expression. Pause to encourage your student to think about events of the story and answer these questions using evidence from the text:

- Page 7 Why do you think Fox wants to be a tiger?
- Page II What does Fox do to become a tiger?
- Page 17 What does Fox inspire Turtle to do?
- Page 25 How do Fox, Turtle and Rabbit turn back into themselves?
   How do Turtle and Rabbit react differently to the rain than Fox?
- Page 29 What does Squirrel think of Fox?

After Reading: Discuss all of the things that make your student special, just like Fox was special in the book.
