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Caregiver Connections:

Before Reading: Examine the cover, read the title, and help your student make predictions. Will this story be real or imaginary? Why do they think so? What clues from the cover text and photograph help your student to know?

During and After Reading: Have your student practice reading and sounding out key words found in the story and discuss the meaning of new words, especially science vocabulary terms from the text:
